

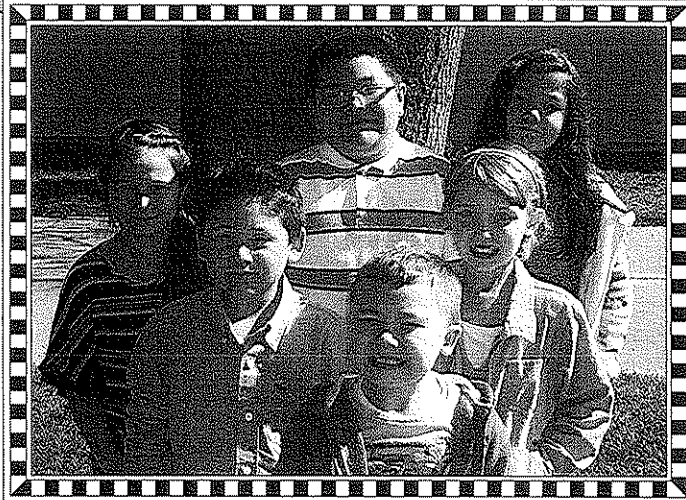

Kids Are Not Safe When Riding in the Front Seat

Too many infants and young children are riding in the front seat, says the National Highway Transportation Safety Administration (NHTSA). These children are at increased risk of injury from crashes or deploying air bags even if they are in infant seats.

The NHTSA's recent study shows that 15 percent of infants are riding in front, as are 10 percent of one to three-year olds and 29 percent of four- to seven-year-olds. The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends that children 12 and under ride in the back seat.

Fortunately, child deaths in auto accidents have been declining since 1998 with 1,248 children killed in 2001, the last year for which figures are available.

A 2001 NHTSA survey shows that the use of seatbelts and child safety seats continues to increase, but too many kids are riding up front.

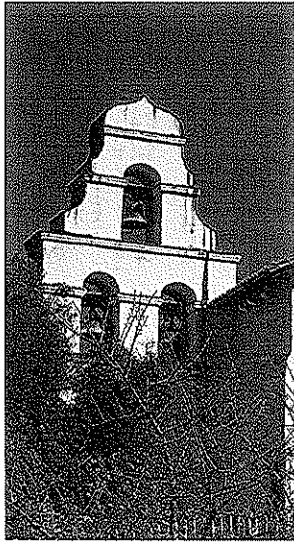

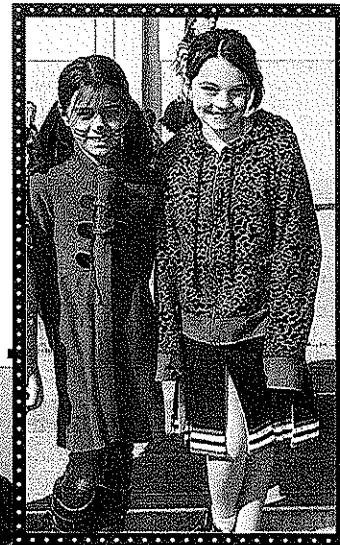
